Dear Parents & Carers,

We really have had a very positive start to 2020 here at school. Our new topic themes continue to be very popular with both children and staff and there is a very creative 'buzz' in all of the classrooms. As part of our revised approach, all teachers are focusing on the teaching of vocabulary with the intention that all our children become increasingly articulate and confident in using their 'word power' both in lessons and in everyday life.

We recently invited other WMAT heads, including our CEO, Dr Annabel Kay, into school to conduct a Peer Review during which they scrutinised books, dropped into lessons and talked with children and staff. They had many positive things to say about our school and our curriculum, including:

"Children throughout the school demonstrate very effective learning behaviours and display a great deal of independence in their learning. Working Walls reflect current and relevant vocabulary for all subjects and there is a clear expectation that this vocabulary will be used in pupil's written work."

"Work in both English books and other subjects, reflects high expectation both by children and teachers in terms of presentation, response to feedback and editing. Because of this high expectation, good progress is noted in the books of all children."

"The wider curriculum has been deliberately and carefully planned to deliver the school's curriculum intent effectively. Coverage and progression have been mapped across the school effectively to ensure that knowledge and skills are developed in a sequential manner. Learning environments are age appropriate, relevant, engaging and supportive and enable independent learning."

It is always helpful to welcome 'fresh eyes' into school to check that our perception of the quality of the education we are providing is accurate and the outcomes of this review confirmed the positive impact of all the hard work and thought our wonderful staff put into their planning and teaching.

Next term's topic themes look just as exciting as those we are sharing in the following pages.

In maths the children have been adding and subtracting using counters, Lego and by counting on and back using number lines.





The children have been busy listening to, retelling, acting out and sequencing the stories of The Three Little Pigs and Little Red Riding Hood. We have also been writing in our role play.

BEECH CLASS NEWS

In Beech Class, we have really enjoyed our latest topic on the theme of 'Street Detectives'.

We have been finding out all about our local area. We have invited in visitors to interview about the history of the village, including our longest standing school governor, Mr Fred Inns. We went on a walk to match photos of the village from the past to what it looks like now.







We have been looking at lots of different maps and identifying places we know. We have drawn routes to get to school from home and to other places we visit regularly such as friends houses or the library.

In art we have drawn pictures of some our favourite village buildings. We have used pencils and oil pastels and are really pleased with the results.



We have also enjoyed sharing our poems and stories


with each other.







<u>Blue Abyss:</u> We have really enjoyed our topic this term. We have fully immersed ourselves into the deep wonders of the sea and oceans. We have explored the five oceans, fantastic creatures, sea pollution and historical features of the ocean!



To kick start, our topic we decided to adopt a sea creature. We were given a sea creature and in our groups, we had to research and produce an information poster. Miss Grantham then sent our posters off to WWF who chose which animal we were to adopt ...A hawksbill turtle! We would like to introduce our lovely turtle 'Kamaria'.

Oak year 5&6

Our Stargazing trip to the History of Science museum.

To launch our new theme of 'Stargazers', we went on an amazing trip to the History of Science museum in Oxford. Whilst at the museum we enjoyed a talk from one of their curators about the history of stargazing and space. The museum is closed to the general public in the mornings, which allowed us to explore the whole place on a gallery hunt. It was also lovely to explore Oxford itself and enjoy lunch under the sunshine at one of the University parks.





We dressed as famous figures in the history of stargazing. Can you guess who this famous gentleman is? He created a well-known telescope.

In literacy this term we have been reading and writing myths, to deepen our understanding of them the curator read the children an ancient Mayan myth. It had beautiful descriptive language and explained how the milky way could have been created. After the trip year 5 and 6 created their own fantastic 'stargazers' themed myths.





To finish our session we created our own Mayan calendars, which children were able to take home as a reminder of our trip.





Through the medium of pastel chalks we depicted the solar system using fruit to help understand the proportional size of each planet. We discovered that the sun is so big compared to the other planets that we couldn't even include it on our sheet!



Year 6 really enjoyed their IMPS visit to the Horton Hospital, as you can see from the photographs it was a very practical and beneficial morning. We learnt about basic life support and first aid. This trip would not have been possible without the support of Oak 5, who baked some delicious cakes to raise funds.






ART in Oak Class

Oak Year 5 children recently spent a lovely afternoon immersed in Art. We began with an exploration of portraiture, as the children created new pictures of staff members. These can be viewed on the 'Our Staff' display in the school Reception area.

After this very controlled session, the children spent time working on a much larger scale, creating some powerful images with only a piece of paper, a stick of charcoal and a rubber. We had great fun experimenting, with some lovely results.

FRENCH AND MUSIC

The children across the school have been very busy with their French and Music learning. At Sibford Gower the children start their language learning in Acorn Class and the children have been learning some French greetings through their music lessons with Mrs Perkins. In Willow Class, the children have been enjoying their 'Blue Abyss' topic and in French have been designing and describing their own sea creatures. The children have been great at identifying different parts of sentences, using cognates to help them with translation and learning about masculine and feminine words. They used their new knowledge to help them write descriptions for their own creations.

The children in Oak's and 6 have been learning about space as part of their 'Stargazing' topic. In music they learned about a musical trailblazer belia berbyshire, who worked in the BBC Radiophonic workshop to create the original boctor Who theme -really groundbreaking for 1963! The children made their own graphic scores to show the bass and melody line of the music and then created their own version of the theme using a variety of tuned and untuned instruments. In French, the children have been undertaking a wide range of activities from reading and writing their own horoscopes to inventing and describing their own planets. Their descriptions have been incredible, with many children wanting to extend their vocabulary by using a bilingual dictionary. Bravo!

Can Make A HUGE Difference!




Choose Books That Are At An Appropriate Reading Level For Your Child
