ACORN CLASS NEWS

This term our topic has been 'Festivals of light—Who are you?' and we have enjoyed finding out about different cultures and traditions and people who help us and work when it is dark such as emergency workers, doctors, nurses and cleaners. This term has also coincided with the festivals of Diwali, Chanukah and, of course, Advent and the lead up to Christmas - some wonderful festivals of light to learn about and explore.





The term started off with Bonfire Night. We talked about firework displays we had seen or were going to see. We also created our own (very safe!) bonfire in our classroom and learned some bonfire songs with actions.

We have been learning about some religious festivals of light that take place at this time of year. First we learned about Diwali, we made diva lamps from clay and crafted them from paper plates. We enjoyed making patterns on our lightbox using different shapes.





We also enjoyed learning about Chanukah. We found out about the Chanukah story and how Jewish people celebrate. We made Chanukiahs and learned about the yummy oily foods that are eaten such as doughnuts and potato latkes.







This term also saw Remembrance Day and Children in Need. On the 11th November the children the children took part in an age appropriate act of remembrance and we talked about how pictures and symbols such as a poppy help us remember important things. We then enjoyed making 'poppy art' using circle shapes of different sizes.

For Children in Need we loved seeing all the children's spotty and striped clothes! They looked fab! We did lots of Pudsey Bear activities including practising our number skills with a game where we had to add spots to Pudsey's bandana.











We had a visit from First Responder
Chris and the first aid trainers Trish &
Aileen from Fat Panda First Aid who
helped us recognise how to stay safe at
home and taught us some basic first aid
including important things grown ups
should have in their first aid kits. Chris
showed us his First Responder car and
demonstrated some of his equipment.
We were all very relived to see that Mrs
Perkins has good oxygen levels!

In our outdoor area we have been enjoying playing with the cars. The children loved using the outdoor chalks to make a roundabout and a safe zebra crossing. We have had a lot of fun practising our road safety!

At Forest School we had a great time using different materials to do some den building. Through experimenting and working together we found good ways to make our dens stay up the way we wanted them to and used natural materials such as the Autumn leaves to make soft den 'floors' for us to sit on.





As part of our topic we have been looking at people who help us. We have enjoyed the books 'Night City' and 'The Jolly Postman' and created these fabulous creative responses to each - a night city collage and a story map to show the Jolly Postman's very busy route. We also have enjoyed using junk modelling materials to make model emergency vehicles.





BEECH CLASS NEWS

This term we have absolutely loved finding out all about the Arctic. We launched the topic with our own iceberg experiment in the classroom and then went on to find out about how to locate the Arctic on a map. We have learnt about different animals who survive in this polar region and written our own fact files about polar bears.





In science we learned about how animals can be sorted into different groups. We initially sorted the animals using our own criteria such as has wings, does not have wings. Then we learned about how scientists classify animals and sort them according to the criteria for mammals, birds, insects, reptiles, fish and amphibians.

We absolutely loved our class book for this term 'The Princess and The White Bear King'. We made our own crowns inspired by the book and then each wrote a letter to persuade the king that our crown was the best.







We had a fantastic time at the cross country and were so proud of how well everyone did.

We created the base for our stones and then painted it with different shades and material to give a natural effect.


After this, we all moulded our very own stones to be placed on our 'grass base'.














WILLOW CLASS—A Homework Celebration


DIWALI


In Art this term we have been focussing on geometric patterns. The children had to draw a repeating geometric pattern first and then had to colour it in symmetrically.

We had great fun on Children in Need Day. The theme for the day in school was Spots and Stripes and, in the afternoon, we ran workshops exploring this theme through circle (the spots) and line (the stripes).











Inspired by the art of quilt maker Maritza Soto and traditional Mexican talavera patterned tiles, the children in Willow and Oak cut circles which they decorated with oil pastels.

A little more cutting and sticking and we had made our own tiles.

Simple but effective.

Inspired by the work of artist Georgia Gray, our youngest children, in Acorn & Beech classes, created concentric circle patterns using collage and paint. We arranged these on paper and then took our pastels for a walk in and out and all around, exploring colour through blending and line and creating these very striking artworks.



And we raised a wonderful £130.13 for a great cause!

We created our very own Christmas tree ...

We were delighted to be invited to create a tree to display at Holy Trinity Church in Sibford Gower as part of the Christmas Tree Festival. Our creation is intended to reflect some of the things which are important to us at our school, including Forest School and outdoor learning, working together, Art and Science.

Children across the school gathered small branches from around our beautiful site. We then sorted them so we had plenty that were the right size for the job.



Next we made some simple decorations using air-drying clay. All the children in Willow and Oak made at least one. We cut shapes out using some very tiny biscuit cutters. Then we let them dry overnight.

It was important that they were thick enough so that we could drill a hole through the middle without them breaking.

Mrs O'Sullivan did the drilling because the drill was very powerful and we had to work fast!





Using just three pots of poster paint in the primary colours, red, yellow and blue, we double-dipped our decorations to make the secondary colours too, orange, purple and green. One star made of twigs later, and our beautiful Christmas tree was ready for the festival!

The next day, Mrs O'Sullivan threaded each one with special wool made from real camel hair. (We hope no-one has been shaving the camels that belong to the three kings!)

Firstly I would like to welcome two new Governors to the Academic Committee: Simon Chard and Oli Broom. We would like to thank them, on behalf of all of you, for volunteering to join and to help us work alongside the School staff to ensure the high standard of education in our School. I can assure them that their input will be highly valued and extremely useful.

We have continued to meet virtually to discuss what has been happening in the School as well as the occasional, and very enjoyable visit into the classrooms. We have all undergone additional training about the roll-out of the new WMAT Curriculum, as well as refresher training on the Role of the Governor.
