Dear Parents,

We have had a fabulous Autumn Term here at school. Staff have been working hard to ensure that the children learn well, while enjoying their time at school, and the children have been working hard to be the best learners that they can be. We have all been stretching our 'learning muscles' and developing our 'growth mindsets' and this has not just been recognised by us. This term, we invited other headteachers from the WMAT and some of our own governors into school to conduct a peer review of how things are going. One of their findings was that

"there is a consistently high expectation in terms of learning behaviour throughout the school. This is characterised by children engaged, focused on the learning taking place and extremely articulate in their describing of what they are doing, why, and how they can improve it."

We have also had lots of fun and done many things to ensure that the children experience breadth and balance in their learning, including a visit from a member of Team GB, a whole school trip to the pantomime in Chipping Norton, inclusion in an art exhibition at The Village Hall, Children Singing for Children, lots of outdoor learning and lots of sport.

We have really enjoyed art this term; we have been creating our own pictures on canvas, inspired by the German artist, Josef Albers.






WRITING







MAPLE CLASS NEWS





OAK CLASS NEWS



We looked at the physical features of Italy and then went on to plan and subsequently make our own authentic Italian Pizzas, inspired by ingredients typical of a chosen region. We used our Maths skills to discuss the perfect ratio of water to flour in Pizza dough and to measure out our ingredients.








<u>Writing</u> Linking with our Italian Topic, we wrote our own newspaper reports about an Earthquake in Italy. To help us to plan our articles, we created our own television news programme complete with interviews with rescuers and witnesses – this was to help us get to grips with direct and reported speech! We studied Romeo and Juliet and investigated the friendship between Mercutio, Benvolio and Romeo. We wrote our own version of Prince Escalus's speech intended to stop a fight between the Capulets and Montagues.

GOVERNOR'S CORNER

Members of our Governing Body have been involved in our life in school in all sorts of ways. We have held three meetings in school so far this academic year and governors have also taken part in role specific training.



They have supported in the background, reviewing policy documents, supporting with the headteacher's performance management and many other things related to the strategic leadership of our school. They have also made a number of visits into school. Governor Paul Manthorpe has visited classrooms four times already this year, twice to look at the ways in which we support children with Special Educational needs, once to focus on Building Learning Power across the school and once to talk about his work as a teacher of the deaf, supporting with our younger children's topic work on People who Help Us. Governors Sue Cook and Warwick Knowles spent a morning in school taking part in the Peer Review process alongside headteachers from other WMAT schools, and were joined later in the day by governor Emma Coventry who will be focusing on Early Years over the course of this year, as well as continuing to support us with all the 'extra' she brings to school as a parent volunteer and a member of our PTA.

Our International Focus

We have been exploring aspects of our life as global citizens in a number of ways at school.

Thanks to Mrs Perkins, we have been awarded an introductory level International Schools Award. All the teachers & pupils contributed towards this, but Mrs Perkins took a leading role and organised all the evidence for our application, in her role as MFL co-ordinator.

Miss Grantham has co-ordinated our Global Learning Partnership work across the school. While class teachers have been raising the profile of current affairs through watching Newsround and reading First News with the children, she has been leading a weekly assembly focusing on key topical issues such as the impact of Global Warming, with a focus on developing the children's understanding of how our responses to such matters might link to key British Values such as Tolerance and Democracy.



WOMBAT UPDATE

The Wombats School Council have now met to review their Hot Spots and Grot Spots. Much was achieved over the course of the last academic year and the positives in our school environment definitely now outweigh the negatives. However, there is still much to be done. Although Wombats haven't yet agreed all their priorities for the coming year, they have identified some. Expect to experience the smell of fresh paint and the sound of happy teachers as they enjoy a break in the newly re-furbished staff room we are all looking forward to. 
Sibford Sport

Another busy, yet brilliant term for sport. We have entered into many events and had some fantastic results.


KS1:

KS2: It has been a very busy term for our KS2 children- we have participated in swimming events, cross country and made it to two finals (which we also won!)




