Dear Parents & Carers,

It has been a short but busy half term.

Teachers and other staff from all the schools in the Multi Academy Trust have joined forces twice, once for a day of training exploring the principles of effective teaching and then to share ideas for brilliant maths teaching. I continue to meet with the headteachers from the other academies every fortnight to develop strategies for school improvement which ensure that we provide the best possible education for all our pupils.

In school, it has been as busy as ever, with all sorts of activities and learning opportunities; on the theme of 'Once upon a time' in New School, and The Victorians in Key Stage Two. You can get a sense of what this has looked like in different classrooms by looking at the class pages in this newsletter. I have had the opportunity to teach Art every afternoon in Willow Class, which has been lovely for me.

As an outcome of the parent questionnaire, we are still looking at ways to improve communication. This is meant to be a positive forum for quick and up to date information sharing.

This term in Acorn class we have been reading, retelling and acting out Traditional tales. Our new conservatory area has become a Traditional tale land with Giants, the Three Little Pigs, Three bears and even a Big Bad Wolf!







We have had a real focus on numbers this term we have been counting objects, recognising and ordering numbers up to 20 and 100, counting in twos, fives and tens and improving our confidence in knowing number bonds to 10. Children have also been learning about odd and even numbers.







This term, we have used the computers a great deal, designing houses for the Three Little Pigs,





chairs for Goldilocks and animations to retell traditional stories.

In science Mrs Fletcher has encouraged children to think about properties of materials and the children are keen to explore our class feely boxes!

We have recently been learning about the celebration of Chinese New Year and how the years are named after 12 animals. 
Willow Class News

P.E. The children have been developing their swimming skills at Sibford School, as well as learning all about safe play, stick control and cunning tactics in hockey.




Year 5 Science

Our topic for this term and next is electricity. We started at atomic level, examining and demonstrating how electricity flows (see the photos).

We then moved on to circuitry, starting with a basic series circuit, leading to developing parallel circuits and the differences between them. The children are now building their own devices using electrical circuits. We started this off by making a light bulb from scratch!



History and D & T

This term, as part of the Key Stage 2 theme of the Victorians, the focus of Maple Class has been The Great Exhibition of 1851. As well as learning about its historical context and importance, the children have been tasked with replicating the event in the form of The Great Maple Class Exhibition, which will take place towards the end of next term. They have been busy redesigning the classroom as an exhibition space, so that it resembles the interior of the Crystal Palace as closely as possible, as well as working in groups to create exhibits. These are based on the main exhibit categories from the 1851 event, and the groups themselves are representing the most significant industrial nations of the time.

English Our class novel this term has been *Alice in Wonderland* as a nod to our studies on the Victorians. Big Writing topics have included letters to children in the Rojo Rojo orphanage, developing story characters and entries into this year's Deddington Writing Competition.

Art & Design

We have been focussing on British Victorian artist J.M.W. Turner and how much of his work reflected developments in the Industrial Revolution. The children have then sketched and are beginning to paint their own Turner-inspired piece to show modern day industrial developments. These paintings will be on display at The Great Maple Class Exhibition (see Topic).

Computing As well as conducting a great deal of research for their topic work on iPads, groups of children have been attempting to program Mr Cameron. The trouble is that they keep having to debug their programs!

Maths Our work this term has focussed on the measurement of time and space. The children have been very involved in an investigation to devise a railway timetable, as well as another to find out how much it would cost to recover the inner courtyard of Buckingham Palace in artificial grass, just in case the Queen and Prince Philip fancy a game of hockey. Oak Class News

<u>Junior Citizen</u> As part of their preparation for the transition to secondary education, the pupils in Year 6 went to The Fire Station at Rewley Road in Oxford where, with two other schools, they took part in the Junior Citizenship training event. Here they were exposed to various life-like scenarios in which they were given the opportunity to negotiate in a safe environment. They all also had the opportunity to make a 999 call!









Injury Minimisation Programme for Schools (I.M.P.S.)

Our Year 6 pupils were also fortunate to be able to go to Horton Hospital to receive training about general health issues and in what to do should they come across a medical emergency. Some of the areas covered included: healthy living, the importance of X-rays, how to treat broken bones, the mouth to mouth resuscitation technique and how to administer CPR using an automated resuscitation device. The children were also lucky to be shown around one of the Resuscitation rooms within the Accident and Emergency Department and they made a contribution of £90 towards the funding of the I.M.P.S. programme which they raised through their efforts in the International Food Festival in December.









In Art the children have been exploring various shading techniques, which they will use to enhance their drawing of their montage created from leaves picked in the Autumn.









<u>Science</u> This tem in science the children have been exploring the topic of Animals including humans. They have been looking at the importance of blood, the function of the heart and the circulatory system. As part of our work we made some simulated blood and learned how the nutrients are transferred to cells through a gelatine and skittle experiment.




Our After School Care facility is expertly run by Charlotte and Carol.
