Y5&6 boys race: Tom Rowley and Oscar Ward took 9th & 6th



This term in Acorn class our topic has involved being 'Out and About' exploring our local environment and noticing seasonal change. It certainly has been a term full of weather!






We have been looking for signs of spring on the big field and identifying 'wild flowers'.

We have been working hard in phonics writing word using all the phonemes and digraphs we have been learning.




BEECH CLASS NEWS


We absolutely love our new mud kitchen and had a very messy afternoon experimenting, creating and collaborating.. We made mud pies, mud monsters and mud faces!

In P.E, we have been orienteering this term and learning about map skills, direction and coordinates.








OAK CLASS NEWS

As always, our topic work is connected to our writing. Using our stimulus of 'Goodnight Mister Tom' we analysed and wrote biographies of Mister Tom. We then used our knowledge to write a biography of our own chosen fictional character. We have been focusing on using cohesive techniques to make our writing 'flow.'



Isabella Coventry wrote: 'How can one woman be a sister, teacher, aunt, mother, wife and daughter? Josephine (Jo) March was born on 3rd May 1848 in Massachusetts, America. Her parents, Margaret and Robert March, were two humble American workers. On the 9th September 1854, Jo started at a small, local school in the nearby town. She excelled in English but had few friends; her best friend was Tatalin, known as Tatie.'

<u>Writing</u> We entered Deddington Writing Competition and planned and wrote some fantastic stories, based on the theme 'disguise.' Oak class had some truly out-of-the-box ideas for how to apply this theme. Here is an extract from Luca Scavuzzo-Molloy's entry, 'Don't Judge a Book by its Cover.'

'Here I am again, on this shelf, all alone in this dusty corner. All around me I see old, out-dated books. Even my cover is horrible - brown and dirty. No one will ever pick me up again. 
<u>Drama</u> We were lucky enough to attend a Drama morning at the Warriner, where year 5 and 6 studied Mime, Music and Dance. 







<u>Maths</u> In Maths, we have learned all about ratio and proportion, measure and 2d shapes and angles. In our ratio work, we used manipulatives to illustrate the link between ratio and proportion e.g. 1:4 is the same as 1 in 5. Take a look at some of our beautifully presented Maths books where we explain and prove our reasoning. We use 'bar-modelling' to demonstrate our reasoning skills and to analyse and solve problems. These carefully laid out books belong to Thomas Platt and George Hughes.
